Why are Child Nutrition **Programs** important?



Oklahoma Landscape

14.1% Overall Food Insecurity Rate

12.1% Rural & 10.3% Urban

19.1% Children (<18 years)















1 in 7 Households and

1 in 5 Children face hunger



Hunger Costs

Health: Exacerbates chronic issues and increases healthcare costs

Academics: Contributes to lower scores and graduation rates, and greater behavior and social problems


Children: Lowers birth-weights, delays development, and decreases language acquisition

Workforce: Weakens labor force, increases anxiety and stress, and decreases household stability

National School Lunch Program

- National School Lunch Act passed in 1946
- Safeguard the health and well-being of the nation's children and encourage the consumption of agricultural abundance (<u>source</u>)
- Born out of the concern that much of America's youth was too malnourished to serve in the military (<u>source</u>)



Free and Reduced-Price **School Meals**



All students can apply throughout the school year



Meal forms determine eligibility for free or reduced-price school meals & other benefits



Apply through the child's school





School Breakfast Program


- Established by federal legislation in 1966
- Permanently authorized in 1975
- Made breakfast available in schools for students who, for various reasons, come to school without an adequate breakfast (source)
- Black Panther Party in Oakland, CA pioneered the Free Breakfast for Children Program in 1969 (<u>source</u>)

Increases participation and ensures students are ready to learn

Child & Adult Care Food Program

- First legislation in 1968
- Program took shape, as we know it now, in 1989
- The At-Risk portion gives children a safe place to get nutritious food and join their friends in physical, educational, and social activities (<u>source</u>)



Afterschool Meals

Schools in eligible areas can serve a 3rd meal or snack

Other community orgs can also participate

Must offer with enrichment activities



Summer Food Service Program

- Started in 1968
- Fill the nutrition gap and make sure children can get the nutritious meals they need when school is out (<u>source</u>)
- 2020-2022 COVID waivers for non-congregate service model (<u>source</u>)
- Rural non-congregate option become permanent as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 (<u>source</u>)



Summer Meals



All kids ages 18 and under can participate



Sites can offer up to two meals a day



Helps prevent summer learning loss



Can be located at schools, parks, libraries, community centers, etc.

Explore Afterschool Meals -

Verify eligibility

- 50%+ students eligible for free or reducedpriced school meals in attendance area
- Program offers regular enrichment activities afterschool
- Program meets state and local health and safety requirements

Encourage schools to operate

Check with the Child Nutrition department

Partner with a sponsor

- Sponsors will handle most of the paperwork and reporting and may be able to provide the meals
- Contact OSDE for a list of sponsors


