

### PERRY PUBLIC SCHOOLS



#### **School Meal Forms**

Processed 200 school meal forms (3 days into school)

#### **Direct Certification**



- 186 students receive free school meals because their household is receiving SNAP benefits
- 150 additional students receive free school meals because the household receives Medicaid



#### Sitting over 50% FRP for the whole district

• Area eligible for other child nutrition programs

Overall redemption rate, based on dollar value: 32.6 %


DUO dollar value redeemed: \$279,390

# Percent redeemed per month based on dollar value




# 2 Years of DUO in Perry
