LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear Friends, Allies, and Supporters,

In 2019, Hunger Free Oklahoma (HFO) and our partners continued to build on the work of 2018. We had successes and challenges, we provided crucial food resources to more eligible Oklahomans, but not all. We strengthened partnerships and built new ones, but we must continue to connect and build more. This report is a snapshot of some of the successes of HFO and our government and nonprofit partners, including:

- Increased access to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) through new access points and outreach
- Increased levels of technical assistance through partnerships and education
- Increased Breakfast After the Bell participation through a statewide survey and request for schools to pilot the model
- More children accessed summer meals through the work of HFO and the Oklahoma Childhood Food Security Coalition
- Held a first of its kind statewide convening of anti-hunger stakeholders
- Built new advocacy and education partnerships that address complicated federal rules

We continue to build connections, partnerships, and capacity so we can better respond to food insecurity. This increase in efficiency creates the infrastructure that makes crisis response more effective when needed.

None of the successes described in this report would be possible without our partners. We continue to be amazed and humbled by the passion, work ethic, and openness to new ideas with which our partners come to the table. We are grateful to our partners, our supporters, and the decision-makers who hear the call for change to end hunger in Oklahoma.

On October 22, 2019, we hosted the first ever statewide antihunger conference, Hungry for Change. 152 individuals from 61 organizations - food banks, USDA, faith-based organizations, state agencies, and many more - came together to learn from one another. Experts from across the state hosted 18 workshops on topics ranging from advocacy and public policy to healthy pantries.

Public Charge Training was an educational resource developed in collaboration with the YWCA and CSC. The goal of this project was to bring awareness to the harmful implications of the new public charge rule and to discuss how service providers could best support the families they serve. In 2019, this training was provided to 19 organizations across Oklahoma.

Hunger Free Oklahoma piloted and

expanded multiple SNAP outreach strategies in 2019. The **SNAP in Schools** pilot project which connects families to trained SNAP Specialists in 4 school districts. The **SNAP on College Campus** program trained over 40 college personnel to offer application outreach and assistance to non-traditional students and students in need. The **Tulsa Community Partner Program (TCPP)** trained 15 partner organizations to offer SNAP application assistance in conjunction with their primary services - reaching people where they are already.
